



ENVIRONMENT WEEK 1988



Once again the Residents Association is preparing to launch a wide cross-section of events for Environment Week (from 23 April to 2 May inclusive). The theme of the week will be "Trees", but we are equally concerned to smarten up the whole Suburb, and there will be intensive "blitz" on litter in the Suburb during Environment Week and in the weeks preceding it. Litter bags will be distributed in as many roads as practicable. Please help to clear all street litter in front of your home. Full bags will be picked up from collection points arranged nearby.

We have reluctantly had to postpone our plans for a mass re-planting of willows along Mutton Brook, having been advised by the Borough's tree experts that trees planted in the autumn stand more chance of survival than if they are planted in the late spring: so Environment Week will be extended to mid-October, and due notice will be given to residents as to when the "plant in" will take place.

However, it *will* be possible to plant two line trees near the Henrietta Barnett Memorial in Central Square to complete the avenue which runs across from the Institute. This planting will be done by our MP, John Marshall, at 10 a.m. on Saturday, 23 April, and we hope a good number of residents will turn out to see him wielding the Ceremonial Spade!

Continuing with the Trees theme, we have invited four schools on the Suburb (Henrietta Barnett, Brookland Junior, Garden Suburb Junior and the Kerem School) to encourage their pupils to submit photographic prints of a tree or trees, and we shall be awarding substantial prizes for the best photographs in two classes; under 11's; and 11-16's. Mr. Lawrence Gould-Hacker, of the Hendon Photographic Society, has agreed to judge the entries, and we hope to display the winning photographs in the Tea-House during Environment Week. We shall also have on display at the Tea-House photographs taken by residents immediately following the "hurricane" last October, giving some idea of the damage suffered by Suburb trees.

In the Tea-House (on the afternoons of 24 and 30 April, and 1 and 2 May) we shall also have other things for you to look at. The Suburb Archivist, Brigid Grafton Green, is putting together a collection of slides which will depict the history of the Suburb; there will, we hope, be some films with an "environmental" flavour, together with our own Suburb film. And there will, of course, be *teas* — proper teas this year, with cakes, not just biscuits.

On the two Sundays (24 April and 1 May) we shall again be organising the "Town Trail Walks" led by our knowledgeable guides, Chris Kellerman and Stuart Gray. These walks were very popular last year, and we hope they will be well supported again this year — especially, perhaps, by people who have moved into the Suburb in the intervening twelve months.

The evening of Tuesday, 26 April, will be very interesting: talks on Suburb trees by Messrs. Swabey (London Borough of Barnet) and George (the Trust's Landscape Consultant) who will both be prepared to answer questions. Then, after a short interval with a free glass of wine for all, Cyril and Violet Luckham will present "A Celebration of Trees". Those who have heard the Luckhams in the past will know that we are in for a rare treat. The whole evening will be chaired by Gerald Priestland.

On the evening of Thursday, 28 April, at the Free Church Hall in Northway at 8 p.m. there will be a meeting entitled "Permission Granted?". This will consist of a question and answer session and will attempt to clarify the procedures for obtaining approval to proposals for the alteration, extension, or rebuilding of properties in Hampstead Garden Suburb. The meeting will be under the Chairmanship of Tony Mandelson (Chairman of the Residents Association), and to answer your questions there will be on the platform Wilfred Court MA, FRIBA, Architect to the

Based in Hampstead Garden Suburb it has drawn in children from the immediate environment, and word has spread abroad so that children have come from as far as a Cambridgeshire hamlet to make music in a uniquely enjoyable way for ten Saturday mornings throughout a normal school term."

"The emphasis of YMC is that children, from the tender age of two years, shall enjoy the beginnings of music-making together. We have a staff of professional musicians who are also specialist teachers. Pitch and rhythm groups for the tinies; recorder, brass, wind, violin and cello groups; Beginner Orchestra through to String Orchestra and Wind Ensemble — all happen on Saturday mornings at Henrietta Barnett School. We, at YMC, welcome the opportunity to show prospective parents, interested musicians, teachers and anyone concerned about young people and music, the very best in teaching and enjoyment of music-making."

"Many of today's fine young instrumental soloists and orchestral players found their love of music as young children at Youth Music Centre."

On the evening of Saturday, 30 April, another "treat". "Patchwork" will be entertaining us under the title "Our England is a Garden?" Mollie and Edward Cattle write:
