

## SUBURB FLOWERING TREES

The October hurricane has brought on another round of decision making for us gardeners, and for the Parks Department in replacing the fallen trees.

Many street trees have been lost, or damaged beyond repair. The willows on Willifield Green are a case in point, stumps which should be removed and the opportunity seized of a really effective clump planting on one of the few remnant spaces which could give a small group of forest trees space to develop. Imagine in sixty years time how a group of five copper beeches would transform that corner.

It would be most interesting to investigate the history of the original planting of the streets and few open spaces of the area. The hawthorns must be original, though many perished in the autumn, and they give May its distinctive colour and smell. Early spring begins with the whitethorns, massively large and utterly boring for the rest of the year, but worthwhile for being the only tree in blossom. As they fade almonds and the infinite varieties of cherry plum take over. True cherries follow, and the spectacle of St. Jude frowning

in embarrassment down Heathgate lined with candyfloss repeats itself.

Chestnuts, white and red follow and the scent of these is a tonic as one emerges from the tube or from a heavy cold.

Summer flowering trees are common but not usually spectacular. Oaks, alders and ashes are native trees of course and naturally wait for the warm weather to risk such excesses. To be appreciated the blossom must be viewed from close up, and this can be rather difficult.

My own favourite summer tree is Liviodendron, the Tulip Tree. There is a group of three planted by a truly imaginative hand at the junction of Hampstead Way and Willifield Way. Luckily they were not much damaged in the storm. The Tulip is an American member of the magnolia family but grows to a hundred feet in height, spreading to square top, but never thick and always glowing with light. The flowers are unique, white flushed olive and with an orange spot on each petal. In autumn the whole canopy turns to gold. Well worth a detour!
