## Community Tree Nursery opening

Meike Weiser, Barnet's Trees of Time & Place Officer, took children from the Garden Suburb school round Big Wood last year to collect acorns, crab apples and haws. The children potted up the seeds and grew about thirty little trees. In early July they came along, a class at a time, to the Tree Nursery behind Fellowship House to plant out their trees. Neil Black played his oboe and the children read out tree poetry while the planting was going on. It was a beautiful summer day and several croquet games were played by Fellowship members to the sound of the oboe.

In the Tree Nursery there are about 70 little oaks, some field maples, hollies, hawthorns, crab apples and a lime. There are also two yews donated by a mystery benefactor. When the trees grow large enough they will be transplanted into the Suburb woods but most of them are not even knee high yet.

This is a joint RA Trees & Open Spaces Committee and Trees of Time & Place project.
