

# Suburb's worldwide significance recognised

President of the Royal Town Planning Institute, Cath Ranson, awarded Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust a certificate in February to highlight the success of the Suburb and to mark its historical importance to world-wide planning.

Awarding the certificate, as part of the Institute's centenary year, Cath Ranson, President of the RTPI, said, "Hampstead Garden Suburb is internationally recognised as one of the finest

examples of early twentieth century town planning. It incorporates many elements of planning that today we take for granted – the importance of neighbourhood and community, the environment, and good design. I am delighted that the Royal Town Planning Institute is recognising its importance with the award of the Mature Planned Communities certificate to the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust."

Cath Ranson and members of the London branch of the RTPI were given an expert tour led by the Trust's architectural advisor David Davidson, RTPI appointee to Trust Council Pippa Aitken, and the Trust President Dr Mervyn Miller, who is also a member of the Institute. Other guests were residents Judith Chaney, Jonathan Seres and Councillors John Marshall and Andrew Harper. Local resident and RTPI member Lester Hillman suggested and co-ordinated the visit.

Having accompanied the group on their walking tour, Trust Manager Jane Blackburn said, "We are delighted to have the work of the Trust, Barnet Council and residents, and the significance of the Suburb formally recognised and celebrated by the RTPI. Showing the Suburb's unique architecture and landscape to the newly appointed president continues a long-standing tradition of RTPI visits to the area. The Trust is proud of its historic and professional links with the Institute, with an appointed representative sitting on the Trust Council, directly contributing to the conservation and evolution of the area."

At Temple Fortune the savings portfolio includes a range of savings accounts and bonds and a majority of national savings and investment products.

# Wildwood Road safety measures consultation

On 25 March, 37 residents, mainly from Wild-wood Road and nearby, plus a number of other Heath users, exchanged views with the Barnet Highways team at an open meeting in Fellowship House organised by the RA, at the request of Cllr John Marshall. A consultation proposal, on safety grounds, had been issued to prevent daytime parking on the houses' side of the road. The original purpose had been to ensure safety at the exit from Fairway Close, but Barnet had enlarged this on the assumption that sight lines could be improved at the lower corner near Green Close. Residents pointed out that there would still be no sight line around the corner and

huge danger if children had to cross the road to enter houses.

There was concern that such a drastic proposal came without research figures on accidents. Barnet confirmed that no personal injuries had been reported in the three years covered by their enquiry. Users considered that a holistic view of parking starting at North End Rd is needed, including perhaps a one hour evening restriction at the top of Wildwood to end the 3-month caravan parking and free up space for Heath users who come from all over north London. Junctions could be protected by modest restrictions on the corners.

Barnet took away over a dozen suggestions and indicated that they would reassess.

# Basement decision at 2 Green Close

Residents who have followed this matter will have seen that the Court of Appeal has confirmed the decision of the High Court in the Trust's favour. The Court of Appeal has refused Sir Victor Blank permission to appeal to the Supreme Court. The Trust understands he plans to apply to

the Supreme Court for permission to appeal, and until the outcome of that application is known, the Trust thinks it inappropriate to comment on the case.
